Your Rustic Association Board of Directors convened its bi-annual Board meeting in April. Several important items were discussed and decided upon.

First, the Board discussed whether or not we should invest in continuing our Rustic Web Page for the foreseeable future. The options were to basically soon abandon the Web Page or pay a host vendor to keep it up for another 10 years. The Board decision was to continue the Web for the next 10 years. The overall thought is that our Web site has been one of our main links to the public to educate them on our historic past. Additionally, the site has been the occasional tool to find long-lost Rustics and connect with other veteran organizations.

Thursday, 21 Oct.

The Pima Air & Space Museum is one of the world's largest non-government funded aerospace museums. The museum features a display of nearly 300 aircraft spread out over 80 acres on a campus occupying 127 acres. It has also been the home to the Arizona Aviation Hall of Fame since 1991. Pay entrance fee at the museum. Cost \$12.95.

AMARC Boneyard Tour. Davis-Monthan AFB has been used to store military aircraft since World War II and is now the largest military aircraft boneyard in the world. Unfortunately, Boneyard tours from the Pima Air & Space Museum have been cancelled indefinitely at the Air Force's request due to Covid 19. If you are interested in going on a tour (if they are resumed), indicate so on your Reunion Registration Form and we will get back to you with details once we have an update. **Tours must be reserved in advance. Cost: \$20.00.**

Friday, 22 Oct.

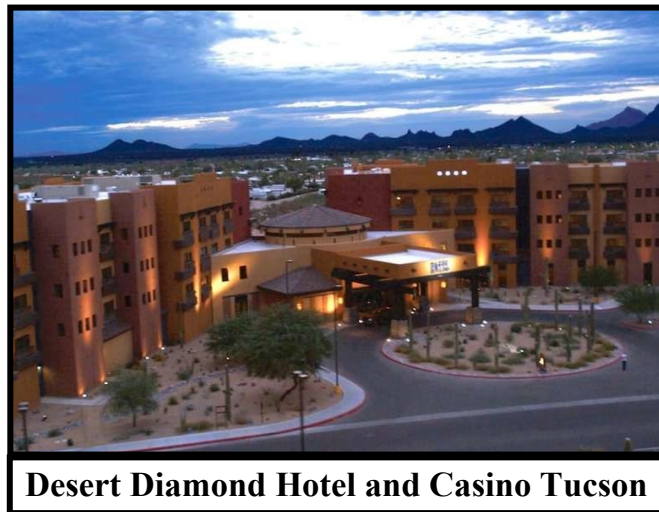
The **Sonoran Desert Museum** is a world class exhibition which interprets one of the most diverse deserts on earth, and the surrounding biological communities--21 acres, 230 animal species, 1,200 types of plants, 56,000 individual specimens, and a comprehensive regional mineral collection.

Unfortunately, **Old Tucson**, the Western-themed attraction that was the filming location of more than 400 feature-films and TV shows, is extending its closure indefinitely (due to Covid -19 repercussions) with its future to be determined by Pima County. If it reopens, we will visit it on Fri afternoon, 22 Oct. We are working on an alternative activity, possibly a visit to Davis-Monthan AFB or just lounge around the pool.

Saturday, 23 Oct.

Mission San Xavier del Bac is a national historical landmark and the only remaining intact mission in Arizona. It was founded is 1692 and is considered the finest example of Mexican Baroque architecture in the Unites States. Tour and video provided. No admission fee.

The **Titan II Missile Museum** is a former Top Secret ICBM Cold War-era missile silo with guided tours & exhibits. It's a National Historic Landmark, the last of 54 sites that were on alert across the United States from 1963 to 1987. Rustic **Doug Aitken** had a tour in one of those silos.

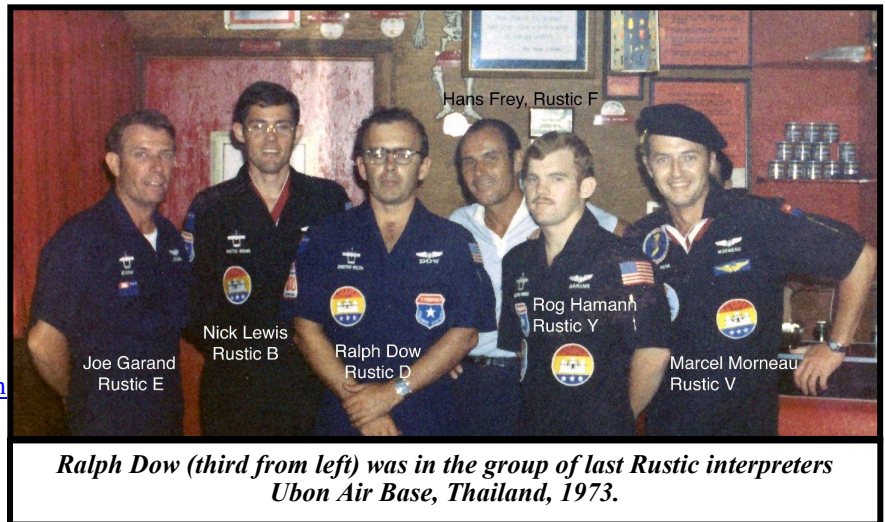

AMAZON AND DOUG AITKEN'S REVIEW OF NAIL FAC DARREL WHITCOMB'S NEW BOOK - "Moral Imperative: 1972 Combat Rescue, and the End of America's War in Vietnam."

Amazon's summary of book:

"In 1972, America was completing its withdrawal from the long and divisive war in Vietnam. Air power covered the departure of ground forces, and search and rescue teams from all services and Air America covered the airmen and soldiers still in the fight. Day and night these military and civilian aircrews stood alert to respond to "Mayday" calls. The rescue forces were the answer to every man's prayer, and those forces brought home airmen, sailors, marines, and soldiers downed or trapped across the breadth and depth of the entire Southeast Asia theater. *Moral Imperative* relies on a trove of declassified documents and unit histories to tell their tales.

"Focusing on 1972, Darrel Whitcomb combines stories of soldiers cut off from their units, advisors trapped with allied forces, and airmen downed deep in enemy territory, with the narratives of the US Air Force, Army, Navy, Marines, contract pilots, and special operations teams ready to conduct rescues in Laos, Cambodia, North Vietnam, and South Vietnam. All of these missions occur against the backdrop of our withdrawal from the war and our diplomatic efforts to achieve a lasting peace. In detail, Whitcomb shows how American rescue forces supported the military response to the North Vietnamese's massive three-pronged invasion of South Vietnam, America's subsequent interdiction operations against North Vietnam, and ultimately the strategic bombing of Linebacker II."

Doug Aitken's review on Amazon:

"I was a Forward Air Controller based at Ubon RTAB, Thailand during 1972, thus this title immediately attracted my attention. The degree of research performed by author Whitcomb is extensive and thorough. As I read each chapter, I referred many times to the bibliography. I found the quotations from North Vietnamese documents very interesting. The courage, initiative, and resourcefulness of the rescue units of all the services makes me proud to have served and flown there. All pilots knew that if one was shot down, the rescue experts would do their best to pick you up. This book verifies that. As an Air Force pilot, I was very familiar with USAF rescue resources, but this book enlightened me on the extensive US Navy rescue forces and the work they did in the Gulf of Tonkin. The author also highlights the many, many US Army helicopter force's rescues and their willingness to immediately head to a downed pilot for attempted rescues. Finally, the book contains a very useful Glossary and Index, to accompany the previously mentioned bibliography. For anyone interested in the Vietnam conflict, I think this book would be a must read."

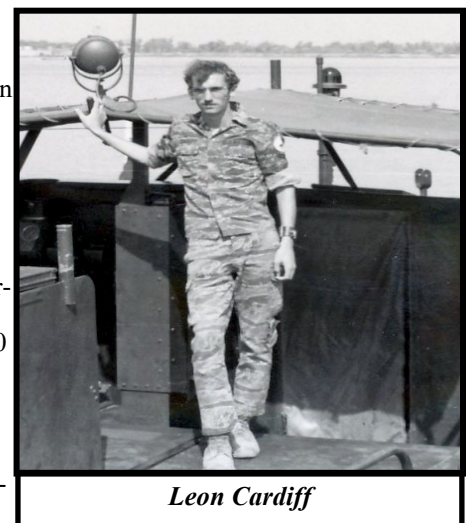
FOUND-RUSTIC ALPHA RADIO OPERATOR LEON CARDIFF, SMSgt Ret.

Leon recently discovered us via our Rustic website. He can be reached at: hey-blue77@gmail.com. Here's his comments:

Gentlemen, I was a ground radio operator that worked at Rustic Alpha on Nui Ba Dinh in 1970 being the relay to 7th TACC (Blue Chip) and filled in at the facility there at Rustic Control at Bien Hoa AB during a personnel shortage. I was assigned to the 22nd, 19th, and eventually 20 TASS (May 1970 - Dec 1971).

I also worked at III DASC (Pawnee Target) as well as being deployed on different missions. Among them was deployment to Tan Chau near the Cambodian border in IV Corps Jan of 1971 to support the river convoy resupply of Phnom Penh. I was doing some research, for my own memory and came across the declassified document on the convoy operation. If you'd like a copy of this document, please contact me. I suspect there were Tilly FAC's (at Binh Thuy - short time working IV DASC in Can Tho) as well as O-2 and OV-10 Rustics working this mission.

I feel that reading how the ROE's changed on this mission especially near the end for engaging is VERY interesting. My job at Tan Chau with a FAC (Maj Thorton) was just the ships getting together at the border before heading upriver. We provided no direct support or help once they crossed the border as our com ability at night from there was limited compared to your contact with Batcat/Ramrod (ABCCC's) or Rustic Alpha for relay. Rustic Alpha radio site on top of Nui Ba Dinh mountain, Vietnam.



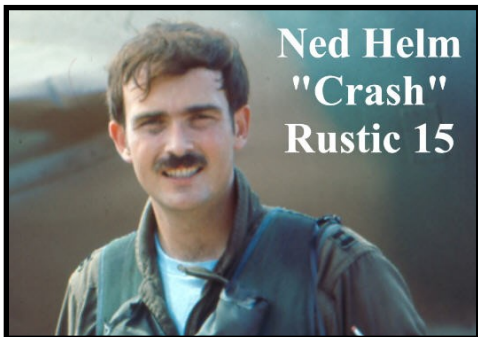

Doug went to SOS in the Fall of 1970 and got orders to the OV-10 while there. He started training at Hurlburt in Jan 1971. At the time he smoked a pipe, however, he gave up the pipe while in Southeast Asia.

On September 29, 2020, ATAC announced it had been awarded a contract to train with the F-22 and F-35 pilots of the United States Air Force at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida. Many of you will recall that Sarady was 10 years old when his father, Lt Col Nady Tan, the commander at Battambang AB, orchestrated the family's harrowing escape from Cambodia in April 1975. The gripping story of their escape and their new life in America can be found in Ch 8 of our Rustic Book "The Rustics – A Top Secret Air War in Cambodia." (available at www.lulu.com, Search Title: "The Rustics".)

When the Tan family arrived in the United States, Rustic Doug Aitken and his wife Carol were their sponsors and hosted them in their home in San Antonio, Texas.

Once the family got on their feet, they moved to California for one year and then relocated to Eugene, Oregon where Nady Tan became involved in the Cambodian ex-patriot movement. Sarady Tan went on to become a USAF Flight Surgeon and most recently was the commander of 59th Medical Operations Group in San Antonio. He and his family are currently being reassigned to Washington DC. His wife and children are members of the Latter-day Saints church and two of his children have taken their LDS missions to Cambodia. Sarady, recently returned from a trip to Cambodia so he will have an insight into current events there.

After the United Nation's sponsored elections in Cambodia, Nady Tan and his wife, "Mom" returned to Cambodia permanently in 1994 and Nady Tan served as the Secretary General of the Cambodian Government (i.e., chief civil servant) until his retirement.
